*Reflections for the final days before the Feast of the Ascension . . .*

*See Jesus and His disciples leaving the Supper Room together. When last they had gone thence with Him, it was to witness the beginning of His Passion under the olive trees. Now, along the same road, they go to be spectators of His triumph. Through the crowded streets they follow their Master. Across Kedron, and past the Garden of Gethsemane. See Him, as He begins to ascend Olivet, looking down into the Garden where He lay in agony, sorrowful even unto death. He slackens His pace as the summit of the Mount is reached, as if loathe to leave the earth and the little flock to whom He is all in all. See Him speaking tenderly, now to one, now to another, a last word. How they all press round Him, as if they feel they are about to lose Him.*

*Look reverently on Him as He stands now on the mountain brow. The fresh breeze stirs . . . His thoughts seem far away. Beneath Him lie the scenes of His life on earth. To the north is Nazareth, where, when all things were in quiet silence, He came to Mary. There are tears of human feeling as He thinks of His home, of the little shop where He worked many years by Joseph's side. To the south is Bethlehem, where His own received Him not. Southwest Egypt, recalling memories of His infancy and boyhood. How long He stands there, still and silent, looking round. Everywhere He went about doing good, teaching, healing, comforting – His Heart yearns over them all.*

*At His feet is the Garden where He prayed that His chalice might pass from Him; where He accepted the Father's Will. Yonder are the pillar and the guard room where in His innocent flesh He satisfied for the sins of men. Trending westward, the road to Calvary, where He became the Pattern of the suffering and the heavy laden, to the end of time. And there, outside the walls rose the hard deathbed where He taught us how to die.*

*Our Lord looks over the scenes of His life on earth and sees that everywhere He has perfectly fulfilled the Father's Will. "I have glorified Thee on the earth. I have finished the work Thou gavest Me to do. And now glorify Thou Me, Father, with the glory which I had, before the world was, with Thee."*

**Grace of the Mystery of the Ascension: An Ardent Longing for Heaven, our True Home**

St Paul wrote: "I reckon that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us" and: "This light momentary affliction is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison." And what were *his* "light, momentary" afflictions?! Scourgings, stonings, shipwrecks . . .!

He says that eternal glory far outweighs our worst suffering. It's not that temporary suffering is so *small*; it's that eternal glory is so *huge*. Your suffering may be the size of the Rock of Gibraltar. But suppose you put that rock on one side of the scales, then on the other side you put the planet Jupiter. In and of themselves our sufferings may be weighty, but compare them to eternal glory, everlasting happiness, endless beauty, and unending Love. The relative weights change our perspective, don't they?

*O my God, relying on Thy Almighty Power and Infinite Mercy and Promises, I hope to obtain: the pardon of my sins, the help of Thy Grace, and Life Everlasting, through the merits of Jesus Christ, my Lord and Redeemer!*
