

### **Patron of Catholic Educators: St Joseph Calasanctius 1557 - 1678**

St Joseph opened the first free public school in Rome (in Europe!) in November 1597 with two rooms and two fellow priests. In a short time he had about 1,000 children under his care! In 1610, he laid out the fundamental principles of his educational philosophy.

In 1621, his *Order of Poor Clerics Regular of the Mother of God of the Pious Schools*, the *Piarists*, was approved. Its members professed vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience, and a fourth: to dedicate their lives to the education of youth.

St Joseph organized and systematized a method of educating on the primary level through progressive steps or cycles, a system of vocational training, and a system of secondary education. His textbooks, including Latin textbooks, were written in the vernacular. He sensed the future importance of mathematics and science and insisted that his teachers have a firm grounding in those subjects. He was concerned with physical education and hygiene.

But St Joseph's main concern was undoubtedly the moral formation and Christian education of his students. As priest and educator, he considered education to be the best way of changing society. All his writing is imbued with his Christian ideals. He created an ideal image of a Christian teacher and used it to train the teachers who worked with him.

St Joseph Calasanctius was the first educator to advocate the preventive method: it is better to anticipate mischievous behavior than to punish it (the method later developed by John Bosco). While believing that punishment was necessary in certain cases, he always preached moderation, love and kindness as the basis of discipline. He wrote "if from the very earliest years a child is instructed in both religion and letters, it can be reasonably hoped that his life will be happy."

St Joseph Calasanctius died August 25, 1648, at the age of 90, admired by his students, their families, his Piarists, and the people of Rome, for his holiness and courage. He is buried in the Church of San Pantaleo.



Admirable Saint Rose, you were truly a sweet flower blooming on a rugged soil; you were indeed arose among thorns, bearing with meekness and patience the stings of envious tongues, and preserving perfect purity and modesty amid the alluring blandishments of a deceitful world. To the sufferings inflicted on you by others you added the voluntary tortures of fasting and watching, of the discipline, of the crown of thorns and of the hair shirt, to subdue the flesh and to make yourself like to your heavenly Spouse. By the merits which you have thus gained with your divine Bridgroom, obtain for me the grace to bear my afflictions with patience, to remain pure and modest, to be meek and humble, to be faithful to the inspirations of the Holy Spirit, and so to mortify my passions that I may be ever more pleasing and acceptable in the sight of my dear Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, Who liveth and reigneth world without end.
