St Louis Marie de Montfort, *Secret of the Rosary*:

WHEN YOU have asked the Holy Spirit to help you pray well, put yourself for a moment in the presence of God. Before beginning a decade, pause for a moment or two. Contemplate the mystery that you are about to honor, and always be sure to ask of Almighty God one of the virtues that shines forth most in this mystery, or one of which you stand in particular need.

Take great care to avoid two pitfalls: The first is the danger of not asking for any graces at all. Ask God's help in cultivating one of the great Christian virtues or in overcoming one of your sins. The second is to have no intention other than that of getting it over as quickly as possible! Many look upon the Rosary as a burden which is always heavier when we have not said it - especially if it is weighing on our conscience because we have promised to say it regularly.


It is really pathetic to see how most people say the Holy Rosary - they say it astonishingly fast and mumble so that the words are not properly pronounced at all. We could not possibly expect anyone, even the most unimportant person, to think that a slipshod address of this kind was a compliment and yet we expect Jesus and Mary to be pleased with it! Small wonder then that the most sacred prayers of our holy religion seem to bear no fruit, and that, after saying thousands of Rosaries, we are still no better than we were before! I beg of you to temper the speed which comes all too easily.

What God did for us, what the divine Samaritan did as an example for us, we in our turn must do for our neighbor. It is a measure of our greatness, and at the same time of our duty, to be able, in our charity to our fellows, to imitate God in the infinite mercy which He showed in our regard.



An Austrian husband and father, a devout Catholic, refused to violate his conscience by serving in Hitler's army. Before his execution in 1943, he sent this final, fervent missive to his loved ones:

"Now my dear children, when your mother reads you this letter, your father will already be dead. ... Out of my experience I can say that life is painful when one lives as a lukewarm Christian. To exist this way is to have more the existence of a vegetable than to truly live. If a person were to possess all of the world's wisdom and be able to claim half the earth as his own, he could and would still be less fortunate than a poor person who can claim nothing in this world as his own, other than a deep Catholic faith. I would not exchange my small, dirty cell for a king's palace of I was required to give up even a small part of my faith. All that is earthly - no matter how much nor how beautiful - comes to an end. But God's Word is eternal."

Mary, Vessel of Honor

How truly is Mary a Vessel of Honour by reason bearing within herself not only the grace of God, but the very Son of God!

This title of *honorable* admits of a further meaning. Mary was a martyr without the rude *dishonor* which accompanied the sufferings of Martyrs. These blessed ones were seized, hauled about, thrust into prison with the vilest criminals, and assailed with the most blasphemous words and foulest speeches Satan could inspire. Such was the unutterable trial of so many spouses of Christ. Above all, our Lord Himself, Whose sanctity was infinite - even He, as we well know, was buffeted, stripped, scourged, mocked, dragged about, and then stretched, nailed lifted high on a cross to the crude gaze of a brutal multitude.

But He, who bore the sinner's shame for sinners, spared His sinless Mother this supreme indignity. Not in the body, but in the soul, she suffered. True, in His Agony she agonized; in His Passion she suffered a com-passion; she was crucified with Him; the spear that pierced His breast pieced through her spirit. Yet there were no visible signs of this intimate martyrdom; she stood up, still, collected, motionless, solitary, under the Cross of her Son, surrounded by Angels, and shrouded in her virginal sanctity.
